(6) These maps are most commonly engraved on clay tablets, and most vary greatly in scale—from very small perceptions of the world to larger inscriptions describing local features, such as a particular city or even individual fields or buildings. (7) Scholars still are unsure as to the antiquity of many of these early efforts at cartography; dates given for some Mesopotamian maps may vary from a few to 1500 years, and the interpretation of their contents, size, symbols, and even colors differs widely.
 - (8) One of the oldest examples of mapmaking is the Babylonian clay tablet inscribed with a map of Nippur. (9) That ancient city, near the old capital of Babylon, was an important religious center for both the Sumerians and the Babylonians, who believed that Nippur was the holy city of their god Enlil. (10) On the right side of the tablet can be found the temple and its storehouses, a park enclosed by a wall. (11) The Euphrates River runs through the city, and two canals branch off from it—one leading to fields on the right side of the tablet and the other running through the center of the city. (12) A wall encloses the city, and seven gates, each one named, are depicted. (13) Archaeologists who study the ancient site of Nipur believe that this map was drawn to scale. (14) If so, this tablet is our earliest known town plan drawn to such scale. (15) The primary purpose of the map is not known, but a good possibility is that the map was intended to help to repair the defenses of the city's walls.
